Catholic Reflections

The Colors of the Church

The church year, also called the liturgical year, marks the annual cycle of seasons. Just as holidays and special events in our lives brings to mind a kaleidoscope of color, so too, the church embraces specific hues at pivotal times of the year. You will notice different colors at different times. What do these color changes mean?

The church year has the deeply rooted human need to mark important times with ritual observance. Each of the colors that you see have a symbolic meaning and marks a liturgical highpoint to guide us on our journey.

Much of the year we are in Ordinary Time, for this we adorn the sanctuary and father's vestments in green. Green is the color of life, new growth, and much needed hope. On those times of great joy, the color displayed will be white. You will see this color at weddings, at Christmas and during the season of Easter triumph. Feast days and the solemnities of the Blessed Mary and saints who were not martyred will display this color. White is the color of victory, purity and goodness.

The color red is reserved for Palm Sunday, Good Friday and the feast of martyrs. This color symbolizes the sheading of blood for our faith. But we redeem this color at other times to signify the fire of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost and during the sacrament of confirmation.

We see the color purple during lent and advent. This color is known to stimulate our thoughts for introspection and creating a balance of awareness and peace. During lent and advent we are preparing for the major events in our faith.

On the third Sunday of advent, Gaudete Sunday and the fourth Sunday of Lent we see father don the rose or pink vestments that symbolize the anticipation of Christmas and Easter. The color reminds us of the joyful reward that comes with sacrifice and patience. It was actually developed over many years as a mixture of white for joy and purple for penitential devotion.

Each of these colors is taken from creation to remind us of the beauty and blessings God has bestowed on us. As humans we have a need to decorate and celebrate each season, The Church has the same need. Colors have always been a part of our liturgy and are rooted in deep meaning. These colors enrich our worship of God in a spiritual, dignified way, with hues that are appropriate and beautiful. The choice of color is not random or to simply decorate. The colors have specific meaning as we, the faithful move through the liturgical year. As you participate in the mass, take a moment to take in the color of the season. By: Carol Morgan


